Review of first-half 2011

1) FOSS Business Models

c) E-learning Africa: A special FOSS Business Models workshop was conducted during the e-Learning Africa Conference held in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania on May, 25th: http://www.elearning-africa.com/workshops/workshop_f2.php. More than 20 participants from all over Africa learned about African FOSS Business Models and the ict@innovation community during the workshop.

2) Linux Admin Certification

The regional drive to increase the number of qualified Linux Administrators gather pace and momentum. In the later part of 2010, we witnessed the first regional training of this nature in Kenya.

3) Coding FOSS in Africa

The Mentored Internship Programme (MIP) in cooperation with the AVOIR Network came into swing at the beginning of 2011. At the University Computing Centre (UCC), Dar es Salaam, nine interns began work on different coding projects. Some of UCC's interns are working on a School Management Information System using Chisimba. There is a ready market for this kind of a system in the education system in Tanzania, as well as other countries. Modules implemented by the students are an Academic and a Fees Modules.

4) FOSSFA and ict@innovation at CODIST II



A delegation of the FOSSFA/ ICT@INNOVATION team participated at the CODIST II Conference with the theme "Innovation for industrial Development in Africa" in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia in March. CODIST is organized by the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa (UNECA).

In participating in this conference ict@innovation jointly expressed some resolutions with FOSSFA, to the conference which the committee noted and adopted:

- The delegates recommend that African countries develop ICT policies on Open Standards in general, and Free and Open Source Software (FOSS) in particular, with a view to ensuring that procurement and promotion of ICTs provide a level playing field for proprietary and FOSS software.
- Delegates also recommend that UNECA to include the promotion of FOSS in its ICT promotion and development program. Toward this end, UNECA should develop strong, fruitful partnerships with FOSS advocacy groups such as the Free Software and Open Source Foundation for Africa (FOSSFA), as well as UNESCO and other UN agencies.
- Delegates further recommend that African governments work together to implement FOSS recommendations emanating from CODI IV, including raising awareness about FOSS and building capacity in FOSS, encouraging the participation of FOSS communities in NICI formulation and implementation, and that ECA should support member states to develop capacity in FOSS.
- Delegates also called for the collection and analysis of accurate and complete data on government expenditure on proprietary and non-proprietary software with a view toward determining trends in expenditure, value for money, and involvement of local software companies in government procurement.
- Efforts should be made by the UNECA and member states to support the growth of Africa's software industry, particularly FOSS-based companies that are using established, as well as innovative business models

5) E-Learning Africa 2011 Actions and Happenings!

ict@innovation participated in the e-learning Africa conference in Dar es Salaam in May, which attracted over 1700 participants. FOSSFA and GIZ were represented with a conference booth to showcase their activities and especially the ict@innovation programme.
